Mast Cell Stabilizers

You'll find mast cells in the connective tissue of your nose and lungs. When these cells interact with certain types of antibodies they burst and release chemicals that can trigger asthmatic symptoms. Mast cell stabilizers help prevent unstable cells from bursting.

You spray these medicines into your nose to prevent allergies. But you have to use them every day for them to work. Therefore, they are rarely used to treat asthma flare-ups.

You can take these medicines in an inhaler, nebulizer, or nose spray. However, since [inhaled corticosteroids \(ICS\)](#) and antihistamines work better, they're now a second or third-line choice.

If you suffer from nasal allergies, don't suffer in silence. Talk to your doctor. They may suggest you try mast cell stabilizers to see if they reduce your symptoms. Or they may recommend other drugs to help you.
